STEM SUBJECTS



MATHS

It's been another exciting term for maths across the school. In Reception the children created 10 frames to make number bonds to 10 for The Very Hungry Caterpillar's different foods and Year 1 went on a shape walk around school to search for 3D shapes. As part of their topic studying Egyptians, Year 3 looked at the ancient Egyptian numeral system. Year 4 looked at the maths behind waste treatment and the volume of waste which is treated during their trip to Hogsmill Sewage Treatment Works.



CYPHER CODING CLUB

Cypher runs creatively themed coding clubs at PGP to inspire students to learn the language of the future. In the spring term the 'Cyphernauts' have been improving their touch-typing skills to make sure they are very quick when they need to write their own code, coding games on Tynker using a block-based language and several students have even been building apps using Bitsbox. Cypher Coding Clubs run on Mondays and Tuesdays and are making PGP children future ready.



CHESS

Mr Viv has been impressed by the play in Morning Chess – the best he can remember. He is especially pleased by the way tactics are being developed in advance of the moves. We've focused on opening gambits and, once again, Carlsens and badges were awarded. After a slow start in Chesslings, we have begun to make progress. Sometimes learning the rules takes a little longer, depending on the group, but Mr Viv is pleased that understanding and focus improved in the second half of term.





STEM OVERVIEW

Reception learned about camouflage in the animal kingdom. Year 1 explored forces by creating catapults. Year 2 learned about existing pollution solutions in cities before designing their own. Year 3 learned about ecosystems – how habitats are being destroyed and how we rebuild them. Year 4 built their own boats, inspired by their class book, Shackleton's Journey. Year 5 studied forensics and DNA and Year 6 explored sound by designing their own musical instruments.









YOUNG ENGINEERS LEGO CLUB

The Young Engineers' LEGO engineering afterschool club was again all about learning through play. Science and engineering, exemplified with Lego – the children love this, and have a lot of fun while learning about STEM. This term we explored different forms of energy and momentum. We built models like a gondola (going across the art room), a MacGyver rifle, a manual spinning top launcher, an electric one, and much more. And next term, we are going from STEM to STEAM – monochromatic LEGO kits!



COMPUTING

We have focussed on internet safety this term and we enjoyed taking part in Internet Safety Day in February, exploring the theme 'Together for a Better Internet.' We feel that digital learning is a vital part of the curriculum and we want to empower our pupils to have the freedom to use the internet safely. The whole school took part in activities exploring online image and creating an avatar. We made a pledge board where we made promises about how to keep safe digitally, both physically and mentally.



IN THE CLASSROOM



RECEPTION

Room on the Broom, The Hungry Caterpillar and Tiddler are just a few of the fun books we have explored in Reception this term. These fantastic books inspired the children to write imaginative stories and lists, whilst applying their growing knowledge of letter sounds. They created a real-life stick man or woman, edible witch wands and healthy fruit kebabs. The children also learned about the life cycle of butterflies and frogs through songs and art.



YEAR 1

We have had a fantastic term in Year 1 and have completed some exciting, challenging learning. We have thoroughly enjoyed our Medieval Tales topic and this has been the focus throughout the curriculum. In English, alongside lots of other fantastic writing, we wrote some brilliant dragon poems using descriptive language. In history we have learnt about different jobs in a castle, parts of a castle and the Black Death and in art we have made colourful shields and completed detailed drawings of castles.



YEAR 2

It's been a full and fun term. From designing and testing balloon-powered cars in STEM to their own computer games in computing, the children have learned essential skills through the engineering design process. We learned about The Great Fire of London and visited St. Paul's Cathedral to understand the lasting impact the fire had on our city. In science we studied the different animal groups and enjoyed discovering animals that proved to be the exceptions in their classifications.



YEAR 3

Year 3 have continued our learning journey through the Ancient Egyptian era with an excellent Egyptian Day, presented by the Freshwater Theatre Company, and we have even been lucky enough to visit the Saatchi Gallery to see the world-famous Tutankhamun exhibition. We've built on our knowledge of multiplication, division and measure in maths, with a particular focus on how to use words to explain how we can find the answer to a problem. In STEM we have loved making our own biodomes and in science we have learnt about the human body by acting as mini personal trainers.



YEAR 4

Our focus has been on the Earth and extreme events. We studied the work of Greta Thunberg and how she has made a positive impact on the world today. We wrote letters to our local MPs, Sadiq Khan and TFL to try and implement the use of 'bee stops' in our local environment. Our texts, Shackleton's Journey and Gulliver's Travels, have sparked lots of interesting and insightful questions about travel and its effects.



YEAR 6

The children have worked conscientiously over the past term. Not only have they all gained places to London day schools but they have received the most offers ever in the history of PGP. After the 11+ process had ended they enjoyed not having to revise for exams. They spent this term learning about slavery in our topic lessons, weekly trips to the V&A and the Science Museum to name but two and in science the children investigated genes and characteristics passed on from parents.



YEAR 5

In STEM we have become forensic specialists at studying crime scenes and designing a brand new extraction instrument to limit contamination to crime scenes. Our assembly kick-started the year in support of our investigation of the water cycle, river courses and features of rivers in our topic, Go With The Flow. Writing has continued to develop throughout the term using stimulus for writing mythical reports, setting and character descriptions and completing a visual literacy unit.



LE FRENCH PROGRAMME

Our children at Le French Programme have worked really hard this term. The children in Reception have learned some new vocabulary so well that we are able to have beautiful conversations now. They can also do maths in French. Years 1 and 2 have also progressed in their reading and writing - it is amazing to see how quickly this happens. The Key Stage 2 children are so enthusiastic that we now have some wonderful self-written stories that we are so proud of.



SPORT

HOCKEY

Hockey has been a new introduction to the curriculum. All Key Stage Two pupils have been taking part in hockey lessons on our Astroturf pitch at school. Hockey is a brilliant sport and it has been great to see pupils take to it with enthusiasm whilst making good progress. Highlight of the season was the under 11A hockey team posting an impressive 5-1 victory against Kew College. This was an excellent performance, considering they have only been doing the sport for a term.











TAG RUGBY

Key Stage Two boys have been playing tag rugby on a Monday and Wednesday afternoon at Hurlingham Park. The boys have made great progress and it has been excellent to see every boy represent the school this term. The highlight of the season was the Year 4 boys' victory against Kew College. Their skills were really on display as they ran in 9 tries to record a 9-4 victory. Well done!





FOOTBALL

This term Key Stage Two girls have been playing football at Hurlingham Park on a Monday and Wednesday afternoon. It has been great to see all pupils get involved and we have had some excellent victories. The standout match of the season was the Year 3 girls' victory against Knightsbridge School. We also played our first mixed football match of the season, where Year 5 achieved an intelligent victory against Cameron House School. The Chelsea Foundation has continued to deliver high-quality coaching to all year groups.







CROSS-COUNTRY RUNNING

We have continued our cross-country running at Hurlingham Park on a Wednesday morning. Despite the cold conditions at 8am, it has been great to see pupils look to improve their health and fitness. This term we entered the ISA regional crosscountry qualifier at Sherfield School. All pupils from Year 3 to 6 pushed themselves against tough opposition. Special mention to Beatrice and Mille who came in the top 25 despite competing against Year 6 pupils.



SWIMMING

This term Years 4, 5 and 6 have taken part in Friday morning swimming lessons at Fulham Virgin Active Fitness Club. The Children have made excellent progress with their strokes including, breaststroke, backstroke, freestyle and butterfly. The highlight of the swimming was the children learning how to tumble turn and dive. We are looking forward to the summer swimming gala, when Key Stage Two will be competing.

Children's author Lexi Rees visited the whole school to take an assembly and inspired us to create some very imaginative stories which many classes continued to write back in their classrooms.
