


Year 3 produced Tudor portraits and learnt new sewing techniques to make money containers. Year 4 studied war artist Henry Moore and created atmospheric pictures. They also produced foods using wartime recipes. Year 5 created artwork inspired by rivers and created a new flavoured water drink. Year 6 produced a fantastic collaborative piece based on the tube map and learnt about different artists and designers.

### **MUSIC**

It was an exciting term for music, all taught via Zoom. Each class focused on different areas of music, from beats and rhythms in Reception to a journey through musical time in Year 5. We were all energised by new learning and discovering new musical sounds. We were able to sing together and we even had children play their instruments live. Although we are unable to have an end-of-year concert, we have maintained our passion for music and strengthened our knowledge to a greater depth.



# **STEM**

# **MATHS**

Learning maths via remote schooling has been quite a different experience for PGP pupils this term but they've worked really hard and had lots of fun. Reception enjoyed a week learning all about George and the Dragon, where they looked at 3D shapes and created their own castles and 3D creations. During 6R's lesson on Alexander Fleming's discovery of penicillin, they noted the time period and spread of penicillin in a 100mm diameter petri dish. They then created a scatter graph to show their results.



# **STEM OVERVIEW**

Rather than hindering our STEM curriculum, remote learning offered a unique opportunity to work together across year groups. Each week PGP students were set an engaging STEM challenge that taught important scientific concepts, such as Newton's Laws of Motion through balloon rockets, diffusion through Skittles and centre of mass by building a 'Pringle Ringle'. Important STEM careers were also investigated, for example palaeontology, which enabled the children to understand how they contribute to our knowledge of the world.





### **COMPUTING**

Lockdown has been a golden opportunity for developing IT skills. Year 6 have continued with coding, creating animations through colour and line movement. Across Key Stage 2 the children have used their study skills to create personal projects, researching online, sourcing the best information and creating posters on Word or slideshows on PowerPoint. Pupils thoroughly enjoyed presenting their projects via Zoom. Year 5 even learned how to cite their sources with comprehensive bibliographies. Key Stage 1 have enjoyed using a range of programmes, from Purple Mash to Class Notebook.



# **CHESS**

Covid-19 has put chess in check this summer term. It's hard to maintain social distancing in a chess game, but that doesn't mean you can't keep practising at home. Try setting up a board in your room and playing family and friends remotely. When playing against the computer, use the 'suggested move' button to learn replies to opening gambits. Test your ideas and be ready for chess when it starts again at PGP. Don't forget to play black every now and again.

# IN THE CLASSROOM



# **RECEPTION**

What an exciting and busy term it has been for Reception. They have looked at different fairy tales, focusing each week on a new story including Jack and the Beanstalk, Goldilocks, The Little Red Hen and The Enormous Turnip. The children enjoyed lots of wonderful learning through the stories, such as ordering beanstalks by height, baking their own bread rolls, understanding the role of plants, writing a recipe for porridge and writing a letter of apology from an animal in The Little Red Hen story.



#### YEAR 2

Year 2 have travelled around the world from the comfort of their own home. They learned about Kenya's landscapes, habitats and multitude of animals. They even had a virtual school trip and went on a live safari in South Africa. The class topic was infused across the curriculum, from English with Lila and the Secret of Rain, to art where the children designed African-inspired jewellery. The children then learned about the importance of the rainforest and the biodiversity of each layer.



# YEAR 1

Despite the strange situation, Year 1 have had a wonderful, jam-packed summer term, kicking off with our Pirates topic. They learnt all about famous pirates, made fantastic tea-dyed treasure maps and wrote naughty pirate stories. Once back at school, we all took advantage of the good weather and completed science lessons outside, closely observing plants and trees, and took a hands-on approach to learning about capacity in maths. The children now can't wait for Year 2.



# YEAR 3

Year 3 have exceeded all home-learning expectations this term. The children have loved their Tudor topic – they've written Tudor playscripts (inspired by the brilliant Shakespeare), learnt about Tudor toilets (not so great) and even made posters to advertise a new wife for Henry VIII. In maths they tackled time and learnt more about shape, discovering 2D and 3D shapes in our own homes. STEM experiments have been a highlight and the children have loved sharing these experiences with their families at home and with their teacher and friends over Zoom.



# YEAR 4

This term Year 4 studied both Gulliver and The Selfish Giant and the children wrote letters, diary entries and log book entries. The class's focus text, Carrie's War, linked perfectly with our topic of World War 2, where the children have completed projects such as filling in their own ration book and they even made a model of an Anderson shelter. They carried out experiments in science and enjoyed working on various STEM projects too.



# YEAR 5

This term has been slightly alien for us all with new routines and new desks. During English the children have studied balanced arguments, ensuring both recounts are equally discussed with supporting evidence. They focused on developing their sophisticated vocab and uplevelling their work, especially when looking at scene writing after studying The Highwayman, as well as narrative writing. In maths past paper practise has become a regular feature, along with looking into life cycles and reproduction in plants and other animals for science.



# YEAR 6

This term's highlights included tracing the US Civil Rights movement in the early 1950s and 1960s. Rosa Parks' story was used as inspiration for one of our English lessons, when the children used empathy to write gripping diary entries. In history they discovered the Shang Dynasty and realised how astonishing their inventions in bronze were 3,000 years ago. Our World Affairs lesson on the sinking of the Titanic led the children on an independent journey back to 1912.


# YEAR 3
